



Position: General Sustainability Intern

Available to: Currently enrolled undergraduate and graduate students

Term: Spring 2025 (January – May 2026)

Pay: \$15/hour for undergraduate students; \$17/hour for graduate students

Position Description

Emory's Office of Sustainability Initiatives (OSI) is seeking qualified students to participate in our student internship program. OSI relies heavily on the work of students for research, data collection and analysis, benchmarking, implementation, and outreach in all areas of sustainability. Based on students' interests and OSI's needs, General Sustainability Interns work on a variety of projects and programs that span all OSI's mission areas (Academics, Biodiversity & Landscapes, Buildings, Climate & Air, Energy, Food & Dining, Purchasing, Transportation, Waste, Water, and Wellbeing) that are deployed across Emory University campuses and Emory Healthcare locations.

Interns may work up to 10 hours per week, depending on OSI's needs and the intern's availability. This spring, this internship will be conducted in a hybrid format, including weekly intern meetings that generally alternate between remote and in-person. Interns are expected to attend most, if not all, meetings and provide advance notice if they are not able to attend (please see availability requirements below).

Requested Qualifications:

- Ability to employ multiple interpersonal, internet, academic, and qualitative research approaches to collecting information and synthesizing it into research briefs
- Strong initiative, task-orientation, and attention to detail
- Interest in and understanding of principles of sustainability
- Comfort working independently with regular check-ins on activity and progress
- Enthusiasm about working on a collaborative and communicative team
- Willingness to present as well as interact at tabling or other public events
- **Availability during weekday business hours (9-5) for a weekly one-hour intern meeting (required).**

Specific Roles

In addition to the general responsibilities described previously, OSI operates a variety of programs and initiatives that benefit from the skills, enthusiasm, and perspective that students bring. These include:

- Communications: drafting content for newsletter, social media, and other OSI activities while assisting with communication data analytics.
- Green Offices and Green Labs: reviewing and evaluating applications submitted via these programs and assisting OSI staff with other program activities as needed.
- Zero Waste and Sustainable Events: reviewing and evaluating applications submitted for Sustainable Event certification, serving at large campus gatherings (e.g., Commencement) as a Zero Waste Ambassador (academic-year only), and supporting zero-waste education and communications.
- Farmers Market: supporting the Emory Farmers Market primarily through creating communications and marketing materials for email, social media, and other formats. In-person availability between 11-2 on Tuesdays is particularly helpful for this role.

Eligibility

All undergraduate and graduate students enrolled at Emory University are invited to apply. All majors are welcome, but those seeking experience in a field related to sustainability are preferred. This position is for a student who would like to work up to 10 hours per week and no more.

Applications will be **accepted between November 4 and November 18, 11:59 p.m.** Please submit the following:

- a cover letter,
- a writing sample (see below), and

 - The spring internship will start on or after Tuesday, January 20 and conclude before or on Friday, May 8, 2026.

Top applicants will be invited for interviews soon after.

In your cover letter, please:

- Discuss any experiences that have shaped your interest in sustainability and skills you think you would contribute to the OSI team.
- Explain how the internship will contribute to your academic and professional development, **OR if you are an existing or past OSI intern**, please describe what you learned or valued from your previous experience and what additional value you can gain from continuing as an intern.

Writing Sample

We request a brief writing sample. Please select and answer **one** of the following prompts. Please select the prompt that best reflects the work you hope to do with OSI (i.e., please answer prompt #1 if you hope to perform more research-oriented work and respond to prompt #2 if you hope to perform more communications-oriented work.)

1. Please select one of OSI's eleven "Initiatives*" and answer the question: how can OSI better engage students in this area? Proposals should strive to be realistic from feasibility, cost, and other perspectives. Do not exceed 600 words.

Demonstrate in your answer that you have conducted thorough research on Emory's existing work, peer higher education institutions' existing work, and sustainability best practices related to your selected initiative. Please cite any sources in the citation style of your choice.

2. Please select a completed [Emory Incentives Fund project](#) and write an educational news article not exceeding 300 words that announces, explains, and promotes the project to the Emory community **and** draft a social media graphic (an Instagram post, Instagram Story, LinkedIn post, etc.) that announces and advertises the [Incentives Fund application](#) that will open in August 2025 to potential applicants. You may attach the graphic to your response email or insert it into this document.

Demonstrate in your answer that you can concisely communicate about OSI's initiatives to the Emory community and that you can create effective graphics for social media.
